President's Message

This past year has seen a lot of new things occur in the BFAA, some of which were started a couple of years ago, and have finally come to fruition.

The new BFAA brochure was introduced at the end of 2012.

We have successfully established a new method of paying both BAC and BFAA membership dues, which is more efficient, thanks to the efforts of our membership chair, Joan Carte.

We received a \$13,500 Trillium grant from the Provincial Government, which was used to purchase a custom built print press. It is now in the Fine Arts Studio.

We also tried some new things such as a periodic art critique for all members, which usually occurred on a Wednesday afternoon.

On top of this, all of our regular activities have continued, such as the Wednesday morning Sketch Group (which concentrates on life drawing, still life, and portraits), the Plein Air painting group which paints outdoors every Thursday morning from May to November, our annual Juried Show which is coming up Nov 3-4, the Kaleidoscope art show for all the BAC guilds, Christmas Sale, Fireside Gallery shows, Hall of Art shows, Art Appreciation presentations, as well as our monthly General Meeting presentations, and our monthly Newsletter. That's a lot of stuff going on for a small group of people.

An organization like ours runs purely on the energy input from its members. As in any organization of its kind, some members put in more time than others for a variety of reasons.

Julia Veenstra

Julia Veenstra is a Canadian artist who has lived in four different countries. Her work is found in collections around the world. She is an impressionistic, representational, lively artist. Her work reflects her surroundings and translates how she sees the world. Julia's medium of choice is acrylic as she enjoys the immediacy and the bright colours.

She works with vibrant colour and expressive strokes, exploring shape and form as well as the constant desire to portray light. The works often develop their own life and the paint creates shapes and detail that had not been planned on but complete and round out the experience. The canvases she paints can be quite large and the result is the ability to experiment with a range of tools that create variety of texture and interest in the pieces and can pull from me an energy and joy. Negative shape plays a role as important as the positive and develops from the layering technique that she employs.

From the Editor

Gery Puley has sent me information that should help the growing and exhibiting artist to increase their opportunities to find a gallery that will suit their style of work and information on ways to develop an important mailing list for the artist to send out regarding any of their shows. (Galleries have their own mailing lists).

Gery says

I want to help the artist, and since I have gone this route over the many years since my first commercial gallery show in 1967 I would like to help them find galleries outside of our own area to show paintings that have been shown locally.

Promotional Direction for the Growing Artist by Gery Puley CSPWC

Mailing List: Develop an extensive list of people in non-art groups.

Include: Relatives, neighbours, schools and churches.

Organizations: Join clubs such as RBG Garden Club, Zonta, Heliconian Toronto,

Arts & Letters Club Burlington and Toronto, Central Ontario Art Association,

Teaching Night School – Adults, Summer Schools - Blue Mountain and Haliburton,

Federation of Canadian Artists, Vancouver - Studio Tours alone or in a group.

Add your own ideas to this list.

Portfolio: Build a portfolio of 30 or so works of your best work over a period of not more than

3 years. (Your style must be cohesive). If you have several subjects in different approaches, the professional viewer will not know your direction. If you have one painting much better than the rest, keep it until you have at least 10 of that growing

period.

Galleries: Look at galleries and select from galleries where your work, media and style would fit.

Write or speak to the gallery owner to ask for an appointment to present your portfolio.

Listen for their comments and find out from them any suggestions.

Find out if they will show your work on commission and ask them how much they will take. For example they can be anywhere from 30% to 60%. You may find that some galleries will take less commission but have a contract to not show anyplace else.

If they are interested, let them know if you have collectors other than family and close friends. Also let them know that you have an extensive mailing list.

You keep control of your mailing list and collectors. They may not give you the names

of people who have purchased your work for your records.

Promotional Direction for the Growing Artist, con't

Public Galleries:

Talk to public galleries, show in rental programs and become a volunteer in the art rental program – Hamilton Art Gallery, AGO, Oakville. You will like some better than others. Art galleries are educators of art through your talks and doscents – Do not give a show to sell but do appreciate the sales. You may show a NFS as it may be loaned work by a collector or one you are not ready to sell.

More Advice:


- Become a member of a gallery, as well as your own local Art Centre and Art Group home base. Volunteer as much as possible.
- Take an office in an art organization.
- If your work is good and you have a direction, you will be noticed and found.
- After you have your first 30 matted art pieces keep painting be sure your work is consistent in direction and technique – matted with neutral colour (white or off-white is best). A 4 inch border may look best.
- Back it up with a Sketch Book. Sketch Books are best if they are drawings with values and with a border about 4 x 6 inches. Strong simple design. Simplicity is the key to good design.
- Do not show sentimental paintings (dog & cat portraits) for example but feeling.
 All art is feeling: Good colour and dominance of one area which connects with all others through movement.
- Try if you can Go to a Master Class for a two-week program with a noted artist.
 Master Classes do not teach "how to" but give projects for the day, such as "Rhythm of the Land." The critique is usually at noon, with afternoons free to paint and in the evenings, workshops of demos, lectures, and group dialogue.
- Central Ontario Art Association has a weekend per year at Geneva Park,
 a juried show and monthly workshops. Get to know your town and Central Ontario.
- The Kitchener area villages are different, and only a one hour drive.
- Niagara-on-the-Lake has great opportunities.
- If you have more than one theme, which may happen try and have 10 that fit as a unit to present your portfolio.
- One note to think of If you have a show and know that you should not show the same pieces in the same area again, choose another gallery in another place to show your work. I have shown in Toronto, Ottawa, Vancouver, Kitchener, Oakville, Oshawa and Aurora.
- Your home town is your central area which is your strong support. Have confidence knowing your work is yours alone, unique.
- Plan a street show during the Music Week but easy to view. I did not like this type
 of show for myself as people might often say "I am trying to match my furniture" or
 some other comment.
- Enjoy the process Study the design principles and elements and become your own valuable critic. You are unique.

Lesley will try to coordinate your coverage with other events at the Gallery. This will prevent overlap and unnecessary trips by the media.

If you wish to have an opening in the Fireside Lounge, you must contact Lenore Lowe to book the room.

I believe the fee is \$75.00

If you wish to exhibit, please send me a short Bio of your exhibits. You must have been accepted in at least TWO Juried Exhibitions. You must wait 3 years before exhibiting again in the Fireside Gallery. You must also have been a member of Fine Arts for at least one year as well as the BAC.

When you exhibit in the Fireside you are required to sign a statement that you will pay 20% commission to the BFAA for anything that is sold while it is hanging there, and also for any painting sold afterwards within the month after the show is down, based on the purchaser having seen it at the Fireside Gallery. The BFAA keeps 10% and gives 10% to the Arts Burlington Council. It is up to the artists to be on their honour and pay the 20% commission to our Treasurer.
